- 1. The sole purpose of the Chinqually Booters Soccer Club (CBSC) is to provide an organized recreational soccer program for youth ages 4 18. The coaches are involved to develop players' skills in a fun, fair and sportsmanlike environment at all practices and games. Healthy competition is expected, but under no circumstances should anyone promote or teach illegal or dangerous soccer skills to players.
- 2. All members are expected to follow the rules and regulations of CBSC and US Club Soccer, while involved in practice or play of the game, the rostering and regulation of players and in abiding by all rules of the game.
- 3. Coaches are responsible for being in control of themselves, players on their team, and the parents of the team players at all games. At no time are coaches, players or parents of players allowed to intimidate or threaten a game referee or anyone at the venue of play. Verbal or physical abuse is not tolerated. This is true prior to, during and after all practices and games.
- 4. Coaches shall make every effort to see that each player gets equal playing time in a game.
- 5. If a coach feels that unsportsmanlike behavior or a deliberate violation of the rules of the game has occurred, they should contact the CBSC Manager immediately following the game. They should also submit a written description of the incident with witness signatures attached within 48 hours of the action. This will then be reviewed by the CBSC Board. Email reports to <a href="manager@chinqually.org">manager@chinqually.org</a>. Coaches should also fill out a feedback form, which can be found on the Thurston County Youth Soccer Association's website at <a href="https://www.thurstoncountysoccer.com">https://www.thurstoncountysoccer.com</a>.
- 6. If a formal complaint is filed on any coach within CBSC, the Club will contact that coach and ask for a written statement on the incident to be delivered within 48 hours of notification. This statement will be paired with the complaint for review by the Club Board. The coach may be asked to appear at a board meeting to explain their actions.
- 7. If there are repeated complaints and violations of the game by a team or coach, then CBSC may take more extensive actions against the violating party.
